Lesson Plan: Respect Our Emergency Services

Grade Level: Secondary School Students (Ages 12-18)

Subject: Personal, Social, Health, and Economic Education (PSHE)

Duration: 60 minutes

Lesson Objectives:

• **Knowledge:** Students will understand the historical context of policing in the UK and the reasons behind the establishment of the police force.

- **Comprehension:** Students will recognize the role of the police and other emergency services in maintaining a safe and civilized society.
- **Analysis:** Students will explore factors contributing to distrust between young people and the police.
- **Evaluation:** Students will reflect on their perceptions and discuss ways to build a positive relationship with emergency services.

Materials Needed:

- **Video:** "Respect Our Emergency Services" (Ensure all students have watched the video prior to the lesson.)
- Projector and screen (if reviewing video clips)
- Whiteboard and markers
- Handouts with key points from the video
- Sticky notes and pens
- **Optional:** Images from the 1800s depicting life before the police force and images of early police officers

Lesson Outline:

1. Introduction (10 minutes):

 Warm-Up Question: Ask students, "Imagine there were no emergency services today—what do you think society would be like?"

- Discussion: Encourage a brief class discussion and jot down ideas on the whiteboard.
- Purpose: This will help students consider the importance of emergency services in their daily lives.

2. Historical Context (15 minutes):

o Presentation:

- Briefly discuss the history of the UK before the establishment of the police force in 1829.
- Highlight the rise in crime by 55% between 1811 and 1828 due to population growth and urbanization.
- Visual Aids: Show images depicting crimes in the 1800s and the first policemen.

Discussion Questions:

- "Why do you think crime increased so much during that period?"
- "How did the formation of emergency services, starting with the police, change society?"

3. Understanding Today's Challenges (15 minutes):

o Group Activity:

- Divide students into small groups.
- Assign each group a topic:
 - Factors contributing to distrust between youth and police.
 - The impact of social media on perceptions of emergency services.
 - The importance of all emergency services in modern society.

Guided Questions:

- "What are some reasons young people might distrust the police or other emergency services?"
- "How does social media influence our views on emergency services?"
- "What would happen if we didn't have emergency services today?"

4. Class Discussion (10 minutes):

o **Share Findings:** Have each group present their thoughts.

Highlight Key Points:

• Reference the statistics from the video (e.g., only 36% of teenagers trust the police).

 Discuss the role of misinformation and sensationalism in media.

5. Role-Play Scenarios (10 minutes):

- Scenario Setup:
 - Provide scenarios where students might need to interact with emergency services (e.g., reporting a stolen phone, witnessing a fire).
- Role-Play:
 - In pairs, have students act out the scenarios, practicing respectful communication.
- Debrief:
 - Discuss how positive interactions can build trust.

6. Conclusion and Reflection (5 minutes):

- Summarize Lesson:
 - Reinforce the vital role of all emergency services and the importance of mutual respect.
- Reflection Question: Ask students to write down one thing they learned and one question they still have.

Assessment:

- Participation: During discussions and group activities.
- Reflection Response: Evaluate understanding through their written reflections.
- Role-Play Engagement: Observe interactions during scenarios.

Extension Activities:

Homework Assignment:

 Write a short essay on how they can contribute to improving relationships between young people and emergency services.

Guest Speaker:

 Invite a local emergency worker to discuss their role and answer student questions.

Media Literacy Exercise:

 Analyze social media posts about emergency services to identify bias and discuss the impact of misinformation.

Teacher's Notes:

- **Sensitive Topics:** Be mindful of students who may have had negative experiences with emergency services.
- **Encourage Open Dialogue:** Foster an environment where students feel comfortable sharing their thoughts.
- Addressing Misinformation: Emphasize critical thinking when evaluating information from social media and other sources.

By the end of this lesson, students should have a deeper understanding of the role of emergency services in society and reflect on how mutual respect can lead to a safer community for everyone.
